My 2 cents:

The fundamental question is "how much WUA, how often", which is captured in the overall "all years" exceedance plot (or decile tables, which is maybe all we'll get in the corrected files...).

I think the WYT dynamic is interesting and informative in that, even if Reclamation isn't proposing something WYT-specific, many of the regulatory requirements (e.g. D-1641) and flood ops that may affect Shasta releases could be WYT-specific. For example, wetter hydrology triggers higher Delta outflow requirements which might draw more on Shasta and lead to higher WUA in winter/spring of wetter years. The WYT-specific stuff helps me to think about/identify specific mechanisms about why flows (and WUA) are higher in some months/years relative to others.
